Concept note and programme

Background

The Development Cooperation Forum (DCF) of the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) plays a critical role in assessing the quality, impact, and effectiveness of international development cooperation. It facilitates dialogue on adapting cooperation to an evolving global environment, shifting country priorities, and emerging vulnerabilities.

Since 2009, the biennial DCF Surveys have provided empirical evidence to advance mutual learning among Member States and stakeholders. These voluntary surveys help governments assess how effectively development cooperation supports their national sustainable development strategies while encouraging frank discussions among partners and other stakeholders.

The DCF survey studies examine five key enablers that have proven essential for effective development cooperation: national development cooperation policies, country results frameworks, development cooperation information systems, national development cooperation forums, and capacity support. These enablers, identified through early DCF surveys and discussions, serve as practical tools for improving coordination, monitoring, and mutual accountability.

The 2025 DCF survey study is the eighth in the series, taking place nearly a decade after the adoption of the Addis Ababa Action Agenda, 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, Sendai Framework on Disaster Risk Reduction, and Paris Agreement on Climate Change. The study aims to generate actionable insights to inform ongoing efforts to strengthen development cooperation and make it more effective in addressing current and future global challenges. The study will contribute to discussions at the Fourth International Conference on Financing for Development and beyond to ensure cooperation remains fit for purpose in addressing today's challenges and advancing necessary reforms.

Key Questions of the 2025 DCF Survey Study

- To what extent has progress been made in enhancing the effectiveness and coherence of international development cooperation in supporting national sustainable development strategies?
- What key challenges and emerging issues at the global and country levels impact the quality, effectiveness, and impact of development cooperation?
- What practical steps can strengthen international development cooperation at the country and global levels?
- How can the five core enablers be strengthened or adapted to address today's complex challenges including climate change and digital transformation? What new enablers might be needed?
